Growing up, I was subjected to bullying at school. I felt like a stranger. I felt like an outcast. Said. So, I became friends with a popular girl, and one day, I asked her, "How are all your friends?" and she's having a party? Said. What do you mean? And I said, Are you drinking? Asked. We've been through a lot together, we've had drinks, we've used it and we've grown. Sorry Not Sorry singer says she started using cocaine. The first time I was snorting cocaine, I was 17, working for the Disney Channel, and I was with some friends, and they introduced me. Said. I was scared because my mom always said that if you did that, your heart would explode, but I did it anyway, and I fainted. The singer explained why she's interested in trying drugs. My father was an addict and an alcoholic, and I think I always called what he found in drugs and alcohol because it satisfied him and he chose it over a family. Said. While touring in Colombia on the Camp Rock 2 tour with the Jonas Brothers, the singer also opened up about being Adderall - and Kevin Jonas Sr. and his father learn about drugs. Now I was Adderall, he said. Lovato started a drug treatment program at the age of 18, and he was diagnosed with bipolar disorder. After the program, however, he continued to use drugs. It continued like a bender for like two months I was using every day, he said. One night I used a lot of cocaine and blew up a couple of Xanax bars and started choking a little bit, my heart started to chok, and I remember thinking, Oh my God, I might be overloading right now. After years of struggle, Lovato remained sober at the age of 19. The singer lived in a sober apartment with roommates and household jobs for more than a year, without access to a cell phone. In March 2017, he celebrated the fifth anniversary of his sobriety. The documentary also explores Lovato's turbulent childhood, and his father is in and out of his life. The film also featured interviews with Lovato's mother and sisters, as well as childhood friends. Also included in interviews with the singer herself, in addition to drugs here, she also touches on her sexuality, her past eating disorder, and her relationship and separation with Wilmer Valderrama.
